The Tyler Prize was established in 1973 by the late John and Alice Tyler as an international award honoring achievements in environmental science, policy, energy and health of worldwide importance conferring great benefit on humanity. The Tyler Prize consists of a cash award of \$200,000 and a solid 10kt gold Tyler Prize medallion.

The Tyler Prize Executive Committee announces the awarding of the 2004 Tyler Prize for Environmental Achievement on its thirty-first anniversary to the Barefoot College and Red Latinoamericana de Botánica. These two regional grass roots organizations are recognized for their outstanding contributions to the training and empowerment of local villagers and young scientists to become environmental stewards within their respective regions of the world.

The Barefoot College in Rajasthan, founded in 1972, is recognized for its pioneering efforts in developing practical means to improve the environment and the quality of life for India's rural poor. The Barefoot College accomplished this by developing and disseminating environmentally-friendly water treatment and energy production techniques, by developing new approaches to resource management and public health and by providing training centers. Barefoot, serving more than 500,000 people, has harnessed the powers of the sun and the rain for lighting and powering facilities in rural villages and by installing hand pumps, piped water supply schemes and roof top tanks to give people easy access to safe drinking water. RLB is especially known for promoting regional pride, self-sufficiency and stronger, healthier international relations among the countries of Latin America. Since its founding in 1988, RLB has trained more than 170 graduate-level researchers from 17 Latin American countries, offered 47 graduate courses, more than 80 scientific events and supported 156 small grants for research in Latin America.
